

- Verbalize your child's gestures.
- Use parentese with babies.

 Parentese is a speaking style that draws baby's attention by using exaggerated words. Parentese helps babies hear the language more easily. Real words are spoken in a higher pitch and at a slower tempo. Vowel sounds are elongated.
- Repeat what your child says adding descriptive words.
- Think out loud.
- Talk about what you are doing as you do it. The more you speak the more words they hear. This helps to build a bigger vocabulary.
- Use open ended questions to start a conversation.
- Encourage children to ask questions, to explore, and put ideas into words.
- Talk in the language you speak best.
