



# Read with your children instead of to your children.

When we use active reading techniques, books come alive. Children become engaged with their brains, mouths, and bodies. Active reading focuses on creating conversation about the book, using the pictures and the story to build vocabulary, and building connections between the book and your child's world.

Active reading techniques include

- 1. Picture walks: Look through a picture book together and discuss what is happening. Relate what is going on to something going on in your child's life. This can be done before you read the words.
