We aim to help children get ready to start school and to position parents and caregivers as their child's first teacher. During storytime early literacy development is supported and modeled through these five practices.

- 1. Singing
- 2. Talking
- 3. Reading
- 4. Writing
- 5. Playing

These practices that build a rich literacy environment are easy to do and can be done anywhere.

Picture Time: When reading books with children, explore the pictures.

- Use the pictures to build vocabulary. Name what is in the pictures.
- Use what is happening in the pictures to predict what will happen next.
- Use what is happening in the pictures to make up your own stories and encourage children to add their ideas and observations.



# Here are a few fun activities you can do at home.

Alphabet Ball: Use a beach ball or other inexpensive ball. Write letters using a Sharpie maker on the ball. The children toss the ball in the air, then name the letters facing them or the letters their thumbs are touching. If children don't know the letter, the adult names it and encourages the child to repeat it. (This activity comes from https://www.playdoughtoplato.com/alphabet-ball/)

**Letter Sound Match:** Collect a variety of small toys or items that begin with different letter sounds (cow, truck, block, puzzle, doll etc.) Write the first letters of those words on a large sheet of paper. Have children set the toys on top of the letter each toy begins with.

**Build a reading routine:** Try to read to your child every day. Start by reading for just a few minutes and expand the time as your child grows. Keep reading time fun.
